Annual Report 2018 - 2019 WERNETH LOW COUNTRY PARK

Jointly Managed by Tameside Council and the Hyde War Memorial Trust

#### . Werneth Low History

- Ancient British Bronze Age Outdoor Cathedral.
- Romano British Hill Fort Established 550 AD.
- Mentioned in the Domesday Book 1086.
- Higham Family Established 1330.
- Higham Family mentioned as Freeholders 1445.
- Medieval settlement established 1550.

#### Werneth Low History - 1921

- 3<sup>rd</sup> March 1920 Mayor of Hyde launches the subscription appeal to buy Werneth Low.
- 31<sup>st</sup> May 1920 £14,013 14s. 8d collected.
  25<sup>th</sup> June 1921 Cenotaph unveiled by Mrs Evelyn Welch.
  - Lower Higham Farm bought for £4,000.
  - Cenotaph costs: £2,000.



#### . Location and Size

- Werneth Low Country Park is located 15km (9½ miles) east of the city centre of Manchester on the edge of the Pennines. All the land in the Country Park is in the Borough of Tameside. The town of Hyde, along with the villages of Gee Cross and Newton, are just 2.5km (1½ miles) away to the west.
  - The Country Park consists of approximately 81 hectares (200 acres) of hilltop and hillside.

#### Ownership

 60 hectares (150 acres) belong to the Hyde War Memorial Trust, including the Visitor Centre building. Tameside Metropolitan Borough Council owns the remaining 21 hectares (50 acres) of land in the Park.





### Creation of the Country Park

 The Country Park was officially established in 1980 when the Hyde War Memorial Trust and Tameside MBC and the Greater Manchester Council entered into a formal agreement relating to the management of the park. Responsibilities relating to the Greater Manchester County Council were passed on to Tameside MBC in 1986 when the County Council was abolished.

#### Vision for Werneth Low Country Park

 The Vision for Werneth Low Country Park is of a place where landscape and nature conservation and informal countryside recreation are in balance. It is a place that is cared for and looked after, not just for now but for future generations.

#### **2018/2019 Highlights**

- Annual programme of grass cutting footpaths, picnic sites, cenotaph area, car parks and areas around the visitor centre completed during April to October.
- Minor works programme completed by the Operations Maintenance Team and Contractors:
- At Riding Track near Golf Course reform ditches.
- At Ash Cottage installed new steps.
- At Quarry Car Park rebuild 30 metres of drystone wall.
- Page 13 At Baron Fields install new drainage.
- At Higham Lane repair 30 metres of drystone wall.
- At Cow Lane install new access gate.
- At Lower Higham Visitor Centre install new Oak bench.
- At Lower Higham Visitor Centre emergency tree works.
- At Lower Higham Visitor Centre install new water heater.

The cost of this work was paid for by Tameside Council - £13,033.



#### **2018/2019 Highlights**

- We welcomed 3,827 people to the Lower Higham Visitor Centre
  - (Previous year's total: 3,433).
- The Country Park Greenspace Volunteers completed in total
  - 4,020 work hours (Previous year's total: 4,182 work hours).
  - See Appendix 1. and Appendix 2.
- During the year the Greenspace Development Officer organized 11 events at which 645 people attended (Previous year's total: 11 events at which 558 people attended).
- Alder Community High School cross country run around Werneth Low Country Park raised £4,100 for The Christie Hospital.

## Conserving Habitats and Wildlife 2018/2019 Highlights

- Environmental Stewardship agreement 9<sup>th</sup> year compliant securing £1,087 of grant income.
- Environmental Stewardship grant income to date since commencement of agreement in January 2010 £43,507.
- Maintained field boundary habitats, both hedgerows and dry stone walls.
- Maintained all Sites of Biological importance and undertook removal of non-native invasive weeds from adjoining areas.

- 710 Hyde servicemen killed in action in the First World War and remembered at the Cenotaph on Werneth Low.
- 15 the age of the youngest serviceman from Hyde killed in The Great War: Pte. Harry Whittaker.
- 62 the age of the oldest serviceman from Hyde killed in the Great War: Corporal William Sawyer.
- 250,000 visitors a year.
- 17 Voluntary Rangers complete 4,020 work hours in 2018 to 2019.
- 3,827 visitors to the Lower Higham Visitor Centre in 2018 2019.
- £46,100 to run the Country Park in 2018 to 2019.
- 21 pence cost to each person in Tameside over the age of 18 to run Werneth Low Country Park in 2018 to 2019.
